It's been decades since Ohio experienced a *Total* Solar Eclipse, and Lorain County is directly in the path of totality. Gather with friends to celebrate this rare event.

Viewing Glasses will be in your Heiser open mailbox on Wednesday, April 3. Michele and her team will distribute glasses in Stephens. Each resident, staff, and Priority member will receive one pair. Purchase extra viewing glasses at local stores or online for visiting friends and family.

WSCC will show a documentary about the science of an eclipse at 1:00pm, followed by NASA's live coverage at 2:00pm. Thank you, Michele Tarsitano-Amato!

Light refreshments will be served in the Heiser Lounge and Stephens.

Viewing areas include: in front of the Heiser entrance, on the Serpentine walkway, and in the Stephens' Greenleaf Garden. **If overcast**, visit the auditorium, WSCC, or https://science.nasa.gov/eclipses/future-eclipses/eclipse-2024/live.

Be safe! Staying close to Kendal is the safest way to enjoy the eclipse. Local officials anticipate heavy traffic, especially immediately following the time of totality (around 3:30pm). Be prepared! Plan your errands before or after April 8. And don't be surprised if cellular service is at peak demand that day. Let's hope for sunshine and mild temperatures! ~Terry Kovach

Life-Long Learning Classes in Heiser Auditorium

Same-Sex Desire in Classical Literature. Tues., April 9 and 16, 10:30am-12:00pm, AUD only. Kirk Ormand, Oberlin College Professor of Classics, presents a two-session course looking at ways our understanding of "Greek and Roman homosexuality" has changed over the last 30 years.

Since the late 19th century, the undisputed fact that the Greeks and Romans approved of, and participated in, homoerotic sex has been posited as a "problem" (cf. John Addington Symonds' A Problem in Greek Ethics). The study of Greco-Roman sexual culture, however, took a radical turn when Michel Foucault made it the centerpiece of volumes 2 and 3 of his 4-volume History of Sexuality. In those works, Foucault argued that the Greeks and Romans did not use our modern categories of homo- and hetero-sexual and did not consider homoerotic desire to be fundamentally different from heteroerotic desire.

We will examine several primary texts and discuss the ways that our understanding of "Greek and Roman homosexuality" has changed fundamentally. No knowledge of Foucault required!

Texts: Love Poetry of Sappho and Theognis; Plato's Symposium (excerpts); Lucian's Dialogues of the Courtesans 5, coupled with the story of Iphis from Ovid's Metamorphoses.

Each year the LDNC receives residents' suggestions for nominees for the Kendal at Oberlin Residents Association (KORA) positions. These include KORA Officers, KORA Councilors, and members of the Leadership Development and Nominations Committee (LDNC).

We encourage all residents to consider serving and also to nominate candidates for positions.

The LDNC reviews nominations and interviews residents, with the goal of involving a wide range of residents in our community governance. In a given year we may receive more nominations than there are openings available; however, all suggestions are appreciated as LDNC maintains a pool of candidates for unanticipated openings and for openings in future years.

LDNC offers the following guidelines, when nominating a resident to serve the Residents Association:

- Ensure that nominees have lived at Kendal for at least one year.
- Obtain the consent of the person you are suggesting, making clear that your suggestion does not guarantee that they will be on the LDNC's recommended slate.
- Fill out an LDNC Nomination Form and place the form in open mailbox 45 Attn: Shirley Taylor.




We will have more geraniums this year and a variety of houseplants and vegetable plants to choose from. Some bulbs and root plants from the Courtyard Garden will be available for sale.



Israeli-Palestinian Conflict **Study Group Planned**



One of the great benefits of living in Oberlin is that there are many community celebrations and events. One that's especially important for our Kendal Community is the Oberlin Chalk Walk.



Oberlin City has a community committee which plans, funds, and oversees the event. But the actual distribution of chalk and other supplies is the responsibility of our Kendal at Oberlin residents. Each year about three dozen Kendal volunteers give out sidewalk chalk to anyone who shows up; these participants then pick out a spot on downtown Oberlin's sidewalk and draw anything they want. This year we expect about 2,000 artists from all over the region to join in the festivities.

Kendal volunteers work in two-hour shifts at assigned locations in downtown Oberlin to register the artists, hand out supplies, and have a good time chatting with people. Supplies provided by the city include lots of drinking water, chalk, cardboard to kneel on, sponges to smooth out drawings, and cleaning wipes to remove chalk from the artists' hands.

Kendal Ride Share Program Needs Drivers

Since 2016 the Ride Share program has been part of the KORA Transportation Committee. In this program qualified residents provide transportation to other residents for medical appointments outside of Lorain County. It costs \$10/yr. to enroll in this program and be eligible for a ride.

Residents who are eligible can schedule transportation to medical appointments in Cleveland, Akron, and surrounding areas. Many residents already provide rides for friends and neighbors. Ride Share's purpose is to ensure that everyone needing a ride has an opportunity to secure one at minimal cost. (A commercial ride to downtown Cleveland can cost \$150 or more).

However, there has been an attrition of volunteer drivers. If you would be interested in being a driver, contact Gerry Findlan or Kenneth Cheek to receive information regarding becoming a driver and other details.

Most volunteer drivers make a trip once every two or three months.

This is a wonderful program for Kendal residents, and we hope you can help it continue.

From the John Bartram Arboretum Celebrating Arbor Day

Spring in the Courtyard Garden

Kendal residents are enjoying the continuously unfolding display of spring bulbs in our Courtyard Garden. First to arrive: crocus of many colors, numerous kinds of daffodils, and winter aconite. Our local woodland



"spring ephemerals" include bloodroot, large-flowered trillium, and Virginia bluebells. Additional bulbs, represented by many varieties of hyacinths and tulips, come later in mixed and pure arrays scattered almost everywhere.

Having survived their third winter, Brutus and Woody, our two painted turtles, can often be seen taking in some sun perched on the rocks that border their pool. Woody, who lacks a hind leg, continues to do quite well. An attempt last summer to make a reptilian threesome failed; the added member proved overly aggressive. He or she (we never figured out the gender) currently resides in Center Pond whence it came.

Designed to be therapeutic rather than strictly aesthetic, our courtyard garden is worth a regular visit. Our collection of hardy cacti will begin flowering in late May and continue well into June. And then come the fruits. The strawberries are a sure thing, but the spring arriving so early this year almost surely will deny us our peach crop.


Interested in Rollator Dancing?

Dining Matters

The Bistro has been open in the Langston for a month now. If you haven't taken the time to sample the menu, we urge you to do so.

The menu was carefully constructed to give diners the opportunity to create a variety of attractive bowls, flatbreads, salads, and sandwiches. After some complaints, the grains, vegetables, and proteins for the bowls are now being served hot. Toppings like chutneys, guacamole, and hummus are still cold.

For the most part, main dishes are prepared to order. If you notice an entree being held on a warming plate and you prefer to have your serving cooked fresh, just request that yours be made from scratch. This of course means that you will have to wait a few

extra minutes for its completion.

The Bistro menu will be served at lunch and dinner for two or three weeks at a time. We are counting on residents to use their ingenuity to create variety using these menus. Because the dining staff is scrambling to offer these new menu options, we do not yet have complete ingredient lists. You can always ask for clarification and ingredient lists if you are in doubt.

You can expect some changes in the coffee cup and drink cup arrangements. We are not sure what cups will be available, but the compostable cups are not working well, so expect some variation in the cup availability.

Essential Tremor Group Tues., Apr., 9 - 3:00pm - Crossroads

Essential tremor is familiar to Kendal residents because it is very common and worsens with age. Significant impairment occurs in over 10% of people who are over 80. The main symptom is shaky hands, but the tremor may also occur in the head, jaw, or voice. Handwriting, sewing, drinking from a glass, and eating with silverware can become very frustrating. Thanks to recent research there are effective treatments for hand tremor but not yet for tremor of the head, jaw, or voice.

The Essential Tremor Support Group is open to all residents who want to learn more about this frustrating malady. Sharing experience is one of the best things we can do to help each other. We discuss coping strategies, assistive devices, research progress, pros and cons of treatment, and anything else that is relevant to our experience with essential tremor.
